Our Common Future: The Future of Multilateralism Post 2030

We In the face of the largest youth demographic in history and urgent global challenges, investment in young people and future generations is crucial. Due to multiple crises, young people are twice as likely to live in poverty and three times more likely to lose their job that adults. Most young people also live in countries that are underrepresented and marginalized in global bodies, and it is only through international cooperation that we can more effectively protect their interests in the future. It's time to change our approach and start working with and for young people as a strategic investment that fosters global cooperation. This workshop aims to underscore the significance of investing in young people and future generations.


